### **OBJECTIVES**



To assess general attitudes about the present and the future of the State of Texas.



To assess levels of concern about specific issues as well as overall concern about the future of Texas.



To measure the correlation of issues, concerns and attitudinal statements with the opinion that the Texas State Legislature should act during the current legislative session to address any challenges or issues highlighted by the coronavirus pandemic.

### KEY FINDINGS



The percentage of voters who are extremely or very concerned about the future of Texas increased from 31% in January of 2020 to 47% in January 2021. Overall, 87% are concerned about the future of Texas.



Prior to the pandemic, 50% of Texas voters rated the Texas state government's ability to solve problems and serve the needs of its residents as "good" or "excellent," compared to 36% after the pandemic. The economy was cited as the reason voters rated state government positively.







With 70-80% voter support, the survey showed widespread voter concern and support for state action to address Texas' education, workforce and health challenges.










Q16. Have you ever received non-emergency medical care without knowing in advance how much it would cost you or have you ever been surprised by the cost of a medical bill?








Q17. Before you receive health care services or medical treatment, do you think you should be informed about how much the medical service will cost?
