In advance of next week's third special legislative session, a new poll released today shows that Texas voters are increasingly concerned about the state's future — and they overwhelmingly want leaders to take advantage of billions of federal stimulus dollars coming to Texas.


Texas 2036 projects that \$12.2 billion of the \$15.8 billion in available federal stimulus funds can be spent with relatively few federal limits or restrictions. The remaining amounts can be spent on specific allowable uses under federal law, which can include water, broadband, and COVID-19 public health responses. As discussed in a series of analyses at www.texas2036.org/federalfunds, we recommend that appropriators consider:

- Targeting Long-Term Solutions that will positively impact our state for decades, spur economic growth, and reduce future costs.
- Seeking Financial Sustainability by focusing on one-time costs or expenses that can be covered through long-term savings.
- Coordinating Efforts to Maximize Impact by working with cities, counties, school
 districts, businesses, and the philanthropic community to align strategies and
 address systemic problems.




Compared to this time last year, would you say that you are




Compared to this time last year, would you say the State of Texas is




Which best describes your level of concern regarding the future of Texas?




In January 2021, voters were asked to rate the Texas state government's ability to solve problems and serve the needs of its residents BEFORE THE PANDEMIC:




In January 2021, voters were also asked to rate state government's ability to solve problems and serve the needs of its residents SINCE THE PANDEMIC BEGAN:




Using \$3 billion or about 19% of the federal funds for state water projects that **improve the cleanliness** of drinking water and access to water during drought conditions.






Broadband/ Emergency Communication Infrastructure




