TEXAS SHOULD CONTINUE TO INVEST IN AND EXPAND RURAL PATHWAY EXCELLENCE PARTNERSHIPS (R-PEP, HB 2209)

The Rural Pathway Excellence Partnership program (HB2209) was passed by the 88th Legislature (2023), with the goal of **increasing access to high-quality post-secondary pathways** for rural students meeting local workforce needs through scaling the successful Rural School Innovation Zone (RSIZ) model statewide. Across the state, there is strong and growing interest for LEA participation and we encourage the legislature to continue to invest in R-PEP.

Current R-PEPs and Pathways

Three partnerships, including **10 LEAs**, with **18 pathways** were officially designated as R-PEPs by TEA in the spring of 2024.

Potential for Impact

Strengthening R-PEP will accelerate college, career, and military readiness and post-secondary success for more rural students.



Texas educates more rural students than any other state, just over one million students



Fifteen of Texas' twenty **Education Service Centers** are majority rural



Over 600 districts in Texas have fewer than 1.600 enrolled students

What's Next for R-PEP?

We encourage the committee to further strengthen and leverage R-PEP in the coming legislative session by providing planning and implementation grants so that districts can have access to high-quality support and essential start-up costs to launch their R-PEPs to be strong from day one. The Legislature should also ensure more districts are able to access allotment funds via increasing or removing the current financial cap to support strong outcomes for students and support thriving local rural economies.
